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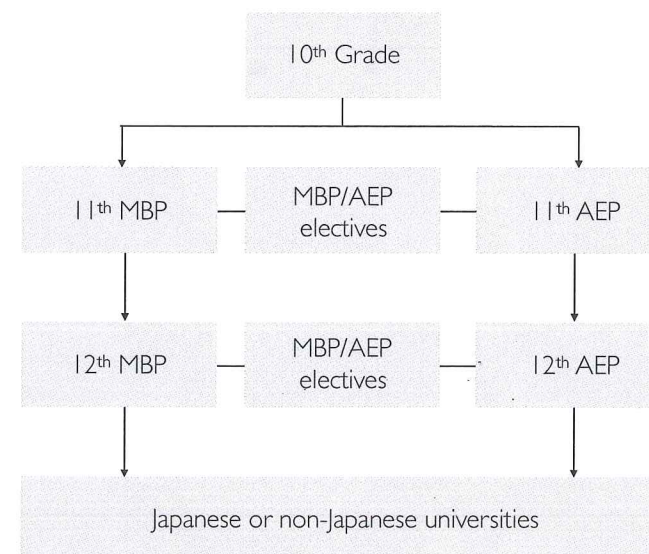
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History and Accreditation

Kumon Leysin Academy of Switzerland (KLAS) is a private, Japanese, coeducational boarding high school in the Alpine ski resort of Leysin, Switzerland. KLAS was founded in 1990 to provide students with a bilingual education in English and Japanese, an understanding, awareness and appreciation of world history and cultures, and to instill in students a sense of independence and maturity that will support them as they pursue further education internationally after KLAS. The three-year high school (10th through 12th grades) is made up of approximately 40 students per grade. There are 25 full-time teachers who assist students in academics and dormitory life. The school year, typically, begins in July and ends in May and there are five terms per year. Students are in residence for all five terms (except for those eligible 12th graders who do a Summer Abroad Program in Term 1). Due to COVID-19, the 2020-21 academic year will include four terms, starting with Term 1/2 which began in August.

KLAS is accredited by the Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT) enabling its graduates to be eligible for acceptance into Japanese, as well as non-Japanese, universities. In addition, KLAS holds regular membership in the European Council of International Schools (ECIS) and the Swiss Group of International Schools.



Academic Programs/Courses and Credits

In 10th grade, students follow the same program and take the same classes. For 11th and 12th grades, students apply to study one of two programs: the Main Bilingual Program (MBP) or the Advanced English Program (AEP). Both programs offer a wide selection of English classes and elective courses in English or in Japanese. However, as the name suggests, AEP is designed for those who wish to challenge themselves by taking more classes in English, many of them content classes, whether they wish to go on to Japanese or non-Japanese universities.



9th Grade

Prior to attending KLAS, our students have attended various junior high schools throughout Japan and have met the 9th grade requirements of the Japanese MEXT, which is one year of Japanese, Social Studies, Mathematics, Science, Music, Art (Drawing and Crafts), Physical and Health Education, Technology and Home Economics and Foreign Language/English.

Grades and Evaluation

Students are promoted to the next academic year if they earn a minimum year-end grade of 2 in all subjects. Students will not be promoted if they cannot get more than a grade of 1 in any subject. 106.5 credits (35.5 per grade) are required for graduation.
